Dear President Biden, Solicitor General Prelogar, and Secretary Vilsack:

As you know, the Supreme Court of the United States recently granted certiorari in *Natl. Pork Producers Council v. Ross*, which challenges the constitutionality of California's Proposition 12. The Trump administration supported the pork industry petitioners due to a misunderstanding of the purpose of this important law and filed an amicus brief ("DOJ Brief") in support of striking down Proposition 12 as unconstitutional. We urge you to please reconsider and correct this error. The sweep of laws under threat by the legal position put forward by the Trump administration is vast. If this view of the Commerce Clause of the U.S. Constitution is adopted by the Court, just a small sample of legislation that could be subverted include laws that focus on harms originating from out-of-state actors, including those addressing wildlife protection, climate change, renewable energy, deforestation, food safety, and child and forced labor. Accordingly, the undersigned groups write to respectfully ask your administration to support Proposition 12, which promotes food safety, public health and animal welfare.

Background on Proposition 12 and Natl. Pork Producers Council v. Ross:

Driven by demand from consumers, food corporations, and the farming community, multiple states have enacted humane standards for the production and sale of animal food products. As noted by the United States District Court for the Central District of California, "Proposition 12 is intended 'to prevent animal cruelty by phasing out extreme methods of farm animal confinement, which also threaten the health and safety of California consumers, and increase the risk of foodborne illness." *N. Am. Meat Inst. v. Becerra*, 420 F. Supp. 3d 1014, 1019 (C.D. Cal. 2019). The Obama administration took no position on Proposition 12 and similar state laws, and in 2018 the Trump administration filed a <u>brief</u> in the U.S. Supreme Court arguing that California's farm animal welfare laws "do not discriminate against interstate commerce." The Supreme Court declined review in 2018, but a new challenge was filed in 2019 making virtually identical Commerce Clause-related arguments. However, the Trump administration—in a seeming misperception of the purpose underlying Proposition 12—reversed position, and filed the DOJ brief in the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals arguing that such California laws *do* violate the Commerce Clause.

The Trump administration position supports stripping state authority.

The Trump administration's briefs argue for a narrow interpretation of states' rights and seek to limit states' ability to legislate. They advance a theory that, if accepted, could prevent a state from regulating a sale within its borders of any product made in another state, no matter how hazardous the product or unacceptable the production process. It could also prevent states from regulating professions and services within their borders.

The legal position articulated in the DOJ brief, if adopted, is dangerous and far-reaching, and risks wiping out a host of public protections.

It's crucial that states' ability to mitigate the harms to animals, people, and the environment caused by industrial agriculture not be eroded. If the Court were to adopt the theory of the DOJ brief, many other state laws would be in jeopardy, including: renewable energy mandates, climate laws, mandatory recycled content laws, as well as sales bans on wildlife and wildlife parts, products made with child and forced labor, stolen art, and products created through deforestation.

The DOJ brief would reverse decades of federalism and constitutional law precedent.

Because the Tenth Amendment of the Constitution provides that powers not delegated to the federal government are reserved to the States, the U.S. Supreme Court has long recognized the broad latitude of states to enact laws that protect public health, safety, and welfare by regulating the sale of goods and services within state borders. *See Maine v. Taylor*, 477 U.S. 131, 151 (1986); *Southern Pac. Co. v. Arizona ex rel. Sullivan*, 325 U.S. 761, 767 (1945). Proposition 12 sought to do just that (as stated in its Purpose), and mandates that food products that present a risk to "the health and safety of California consumers, and increase the risk of foodborne illness" are not sold in in the California marketplace. The Trump administration's position directly undermines the above controlling precedent that preserves the states' power to serve as laboratories of democracy, where they can advance new policies to protect their citizens. By trying to deny states the power to protect the health, safety and welfare of their citizens, the DOJ brief tramples upon the fundamental principles of federalism that have guided our nation since its founding.

Multiple lawmakers have urged the Biden administration to support Proposition 12.
